About Scouts WA

Scouting is a global voluntary, non-political, educational movement of young people, supported by adults. It is open to, and inclusive of all.

While the Scout Movement started informally as an experimental camp for youth led by founder Lord Baden-Powell in 1907, our organisation has continued to develop and adapt alongside Scout members and society for well over 114 years.

In 2022, participating in Scouts is more essential than ever before.

The core aspects of the Scouts experiential approach to learning and development also builds crucial life and social skills that youth, adolescents, and young adults need to proactively navigate the formal education process.

One focus

At the core, Scouts delivers positive social impact based on a value system for creating a better world. We help Scout members identify and realise self-fulfilment as individuals in conjunction with learning to contribute to their communities and society at large.

One foundation

Scouting is based on the concept of informaleducation, and it acknowledges each young person as a unique individual. Our program focuses on personal progression. This puts young people at the centre and recognises that each individual has unique needs. This enables opportunities and reflections for Scouts to learn to take responsibility for their own development across six fundamental areas, Social Development, Physical, Intellectual, Character, Emotional, and Spiritual Development.

One journey

We give Scouts WA members opportunities to experience and learn about ethics, values, and service to others. They engage deeply with their communities and learn firsthand about the environment.

All Scouts accomplish a wide range of skills, covering basic planning through to advanced survival training. Learning is structured through our four Challenge areas and balanced by the eight elements of our unique Scout Method. Scouts are encouraged to problem solve, and develop a desire for self-learning. Activities build upon our method of 'Youth Leading, Adult Supporting' throughout the program.

Many results

Research confirms youth members regularly report improved self-esteem, self-confidence, and interpersonal skills. Scouting has positively impacted their personality and way of being.

Studies have shown that participating in Scouting provides lifelong benefits as youth members develop resilience, leadership skills and grow in self-awareness. This in turn brings lasting positive influence on their mental health.

Additional to the achievements and learnings of the young people in Scouts, it is clear WA benefits enormously from the contribution made by our Adult Leaders. Our volunteers have continued to provide support, care, and guidance to Scouts across all different age groups, starting from Joey Scouts through to Rover Scouts.

In 2021-22, 4861 young people in WA were supported by 678 Leaders who delivered the Youth Program. These Leaders were further helped and guided by 179 Program Support Leaders.

Over 13,404 youth development opportunities for children and young people have been provided across WA and this amounts to more than 1,414,800 hours of volunteering – an incredible achievement we should be proud of!

Our Adult Leaders have collectively provided over 13,4040 education and youth development activities for children and young people across the State – this is a remarkable achievement!

I would like to thank all our Scout Leaders and Members for their significant commitment to Scouts WA, and for encouraging people of all ages to learn and connect through Scouting activities. I look forward to seeing what we can achieve together in 2022-23, and beyond.

These achievements were made possible thanks to the dedication and tenacity of Sherry, as our Executing Manager. On behalf of the entire Board, I would like to thank Sherry for her hard work and contributions to Scouts WA.

I would also like to thank the Board of Directors for their work over the past year in driving Scouts WA's governance and strategic leadership. I would like to pay special thanks to those who have retired this year – Matthew Blycha, Genevieve Hohnen, and David Chamberlain. All have given excellent service through some tough times, and I trust that the experience has added to their lives and wish them each well for the future.



Officers of the Association

The Honourable Kim Beazley AC

Governor & Chief Scout

In June 2018, The Honourable Kim Beazley AC, the 33rd Governor of Western Australia, accepted the appointment of Scouts WA Chief Scout, continuing the long tradition of his predecessors. Prior to being installed as Governor on 1 May 2018, Mr Beazley had dedicated almost three decades to a career in Federal Parliament, representing the WA seats of Brand and Swan. Mr Beazley was elected to the Federal Parliament in 1980, and in 1993 became a Minister in the Hawke and Keating Labor Governments holding various portfolios. He



was Deputy Prime Minister from 1995 to 1996, and Leader of the Australian Labor Party and Leader of the Opposition 1996 to 2001, and 2005 to 2006. Mr Beazley took up an appointment as Ambassador to the United States of America from February 2010 to January 2016. Upon returning to Australia he was appointed as President of the Australian Institute for International Affairs (2016-17), Co-Chairman of the Australian American Leadership Dialogue (2016-18), Distinguished Fellow at the Australian Strategic Policy Institute, and a Director and Distinguished Fellow at the Perth USAsia Centre. Mr Beazley was born in Perth. He completed a Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts at the University of Western Australia. He was awarded the Rhodes Scholarship for Western Australia in 1973 and completed a Masters of Philosophy at Oxford University. He has honorary doctorates from the University of Notre Dame Australia, and Murdoch University. In 2009, Mr Beazley was awarded the Companion of the Order of Australia for service to the Parliament of Australia through contributions to the development of government policies in relation to defense and international relations, and as an advocate for Indigenous people, and to the community.

Hon Kerry Sanderson AC CVO

President

The Hon Kerry Sanderson AC was Governor of Western Australia from 2014 to 2018, the first woman to serve in this role. Since retiring from that role and until December 2021 she served as Edith Cowan University's fourth Chancellor. She continues to Chair St John of God Health Care, and the WA Parks Foundation as well as being patron of a number of charitable and community organisations.



Prior to being appointed Governor Mrs Sanderson served in a wide range of board positions, including as Chairman of Gold Corporation, Independent Chair of the State Emergency Management Committee, Non-Executive Director of listed companies Downer EDI and Atlas Iron and Director of the International Centre for Radio Astronomy Research. She has participated in a number of charitable and community activities including as a Board Member of Senses Australia and of the Paraplegic Benefit Fund.

She has held a range of senior positions in the public service and in business, including the London based Agent General for Western Australia (2008 to 2011), Chief Executive Officer of Fremantle Ports for 17 years (1991 to 2008), Deputy Director General of Transport for Western Australia and Director of the Economic and Financial Policy Division of the Western Australian State Treasury.

She was awarded the Centenary Medal in 2001 for her service to the maritime industry, was appointed as an Officer of the Order of Australia in 2004 for her service to the port and maritime industries and to public sector governance, and was appointed as a Companion of the Order of Australia in 2016 for her eminent service to the people of Western Australia and to a number of causes. She was Telstra Business Woman of the Year (Western Australia) in 1996 and has been awarded Honorary Doctorates by both the University of Western Australia (Doctor of Letters honoris causa) and Murdoch University (Doctor of the University honoris causa). In 2020 she received the award of Commander of the Royal Victorian Order (CVO).



Dr Scott Sargant

Vice President

Dr Scott Sargant is a Consultant Anaesthetist at Fiona Stanley Fremantle Hospital Group. A former Community Pharmacist and University academic, Scott's professional interests now centre around perioperative medicine, regional anaesthesia and teaching trainee doctors and medical students. Scott is a Fellow of the Australian and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists, a member of the External Advisory Board to the Notre Dame School of Medicine and the Australian Medical Association (WA). Scott joined Scouting in 1986 as a Cub

Scout and progressed through all youth sections achieving both the Queens Scout and Baden Powell Scout Awards. Since 1996 he has been a Cub Scout Leader, Venturer Scout Leader, Rover Crew Leader, WA Rover Council Chair, National Youth Council Adviser, 14th Australian Venture Chairman and Scouts WA Board member. Scott has served continuously as WA Branch Vice President since his first appointment in 2016.



Hon. Dr Ken Michael AC

Patron

The Honourable Dr Ken Michael AC KStJ was the thirtieth Governor of Western Australia and served as Chief Scout during his Vice Regal term from 2006 to 2011. A distinguished engineer, Dr Michael is widely known for his tireless contribution to many aspects of government, business and community in Western Australia spanning more than 50 years. Dr Michael studied at The University of Western Australia and Imperial College London. He is former Commissioner of Main Roads WA and served as Chancellor of The University of Western Australia.

He is also former President and Chair of the Western Australian Cricket Association. He recently retired as Chair of the International Centre for Radio Astronomy Research (ICRAR) and Perth Modern School Board and continues to serve the community through his involvement in other Boards and Committees. Dr Michael was named Western Australian Citizen of the Year in 2001 in the category of the Professions and received the Centenary Medal for service to the public, engineering and the Greek Community. Having been made a Member of the Order of Australia in 1996, he was elevated to a Companion of the Order of Australia in the 2006 Australia Day Honours. Dr Michael was the Scouts WA President from 2013 to 2021. Dr Ken is now Patron to Scouts WA.

Greg has retired from his nationwide Engineering Consulting practice – Structerre Consulting Engineers – after 39 years of practice as a Professional Engineer but retains a financial interest and regularly meets with his senior partners, providing advice and guidance as needed. He served as President of the prestigious Royal Perth Golf Club from 2012-2014, following two years as Vice President. He has been a Board Member at Golf WA, a not-for-profit, volunteer-driven State Sporting Organisation since March 2014 and has been its Chairperson since



2018. Greg has been a member of the Subiaco Scout Group since approximately 1998. He has been a Youth Leader there since 2002 – as a Scout Leader, Venturer Leader and Rover Advisor – and has been a member of the Group's Committee as Deputy Chair since 2005. Greg has served on a Scouts WA Advisory Group in the review of all of the Branch's real estate interests and he is currently the Scouts WA Honorary Engineer. He remains a passionate advocate for the organisation, its purpose and its achievements.

Miriam Stanborough

Vice Chair

A chemical engineer with additional degrees in Arts and Mineral Economics, Miriam has worked for major resources and contracting companies in a variety of roles including engineering, project management, diversity policy, project controls, marketing, technical development and innovation. Miriam is currently a Director of Pilbara Minerals. Miriam is an experienced manager and non-executive director who currently sits on two additional not-for-profit Boards (SHINE Inspire Achieve Belong Inc and the Northern Agricultural Catchments Council) and the Board of a statutory authority (the Minerals Research Institute of WA).



Ayden Mackenzie JP

Chief Commissioner

For the past 13 years, Ayden has worked as a Youth and Community Development Officer for various local governments. Ayden is also a member of the Governance Committee for the Youth Affairs Council of Western Australia. Ayden Mackenzie joined Scouts in 1994 as a Venturer Scout and is a Queen's Scout awardee. In July 2020, Ayden was appointed to the position of Chief Commissioner. He is WA's representative on the National Operations Committee of Scouts Australia. Ayden is responsible for the operation and implementation of the Scouts Australia



Program in Western Australia, and In recognition of an outstanding contribution to Rovering, Ayden received the National Rover Service Award in 2010. He was awarded the Silver Koala in 2018 in recognition of his outstanding service to Scouting and the Black Swan Award for eminent achievement and meritorious service that has advanced Scouting in an extraordinary way.

Rebecca has a Bachelor of Arts and a Graduate Diploma in Secondary Education from the University of Notre Dame and recently completed a Master of Education at Edith Cowan University. Rebecca is currently Head of Teaching at Communicare Academy, a school for at-risk and disengaged youth, where she manages the school operations, policies, funding, and disability inclusion and supports. Rebecca Morse joined Scouting in 2005 after moving to Australia from Scotland with her family. Rebecca started in Venturers, after having been a Brownie and a Guide in

Scotland, and continued right through to Rovers and was booted in 2017. During her time in Rovers, Rebecca held many committee positions for WARC, the governing body of the Scouts WA Rover Section. Our Volunteers, Adults in Scouting & Training

Youth Leading, Adults Supporting is one of the eight key elements we centre the Scout Method around. Scouting is a partnership between our children, adolescent and young adults and the adult supporters of their Group.

Young people learn to lead at Scouts, making developmentally appropriate decisions about their program. Adults assist, guide, encourage, mentor and advise Scouts by transforming skills into meaningful learning experiences. Adult volunteers have important roles to play, from ensuring safety and continuity of the program, to providing crucial mentoring support for youth members.

Scouting could not have existed around the world without the support of adults, most of them volunteers, performing a wide range of skilled roles and functions. The scale of the training, organisation and function of our system is often overlooked or underestimated.

One Program

To deliver the Scouting program across all sections, the various skills, competencies and training experiences required have been identified and organised into relevant proficiencies as part of our national Adult supporters' five step training program.

Complementing this framework is an organisation of volunteers and professionals overseeing the logistics required to conduct Scout training and provide education, support and mentoring for the whole adult management system.

Our Adult Training curriculum is a highly structured program providing valuable skills and qualifications for the volunteer adults.

The quality of the Youth Program and the impact that Scouting has on society depends on the quality of our adults – Adults perform key roles and functions in making it possible to put our Mission into action. Training is considered as a continuous process so as to regularly develop their competencies and empower them to engage with the youth program.

Chief Commissioner of Scouts WA

Ayden Mackenzie, Chief Commissioner of Scouts WA, is our most senior state volunteer and heads up the team that organises, supports, and trains our volunteers. Ayden is a passionate advocate in the ethos of Youth Leading, Adult Supporting. His focus is on youth members and their program remaining at the core of everything we do.

As Chief Commissioner, Ayden has built a Branch Leadership Team to work with him on training, planning and strategy for the Youth Program Delivery and the Youth Program Supports.

The Branch Leadership Team (BLT) comprises:

1. Youth Program delivery management: Regional Chief Commissioners (RCC) x four

WA is divided into 4 regions: Perth North, Perth South, Country North and Country South/

Under these areas, each is further divided into Districts encompassing 110+ Scout Groups.

RCC's provide support to the Scout formations under their care and ensure excellent program delivery to youth in their areas.

2. Youth Program support management: Deputy Chief Commissioners (DCC) x five

Each of the DCC's roles involves developing and supporting different aspects of the delivery of the national Scouts Australia Youth Program.

- a. Program Support Creating opportunities for youth members to participate in the wide range of challenges and experiences that Scouts are renowned for. Program support is pivotal in encouraging Scouts to achieve the purpose of Scouting.
- b. Youth Support Ensures that the voice of our youth members is heard. Also facilitates consultation and collaboration in decisionmaking regarding the program and the youth members' journey.
- c. Training Support Scouts WA follows the National Curriculum for training all Adult leaders in delivery of the Youth Program and for Program Support. Scouts Australia operates the Wood Badge Training Program as a system for the training and development of all its Adult Leaders. It comprises Essentials, Adventure, Management, and Leadership curriculums, which are proficiency based and relate to the specific functions of each type of Leader. Additional training programs enhance the acquisition of further skills and knowledge.



- d. Member Support Well-being and welfare support to members including supplemental learning, education and awareness, tools and development opportunities and meeting the needs of the membership within the Scouting context.
- e. Operational Support provides oversight and management of many support services and resources for the continuing needs of Scouting. Also ensures the physical asset needs of Groups at a strategic level are identified and plans accordingly.

3. Assistant Chief Commissioner

The ACC assists the Chief Commissioner as required. Current projects include working on Ethical Standards, Marketing and with the Chief Commissioners on events.

4. Chief Executive Officer

The CEO, Jess Karlsson's presence on the BLT together with Richard Dearmun, our Operations Manager, provide a vital link between volunteers and the support of professional staff members at the Head Office, ensuring a collaborative work process that supports the purpose of Scouting.

Scouts Program Delivery & Support

Each Youth Member requires access to materials, trained Leaders, facilities, and opportunities to participate in events and programs that challenge them as individuals.

Youth Program Participants

The participants of the Youth Program are the focus. Every part of Scouting exists to provide the support needed to deliver quality youth programs and opportunities for personal development to the young people who participate in the Scouting.

Adult Supporters of the Program

Adult Members of the Association support Youth Members who lead their program. These Leaders fit into two categories: Youth Program Leaders – those responsible directly for assisting in the delivery of the program, and Program Support Leaders – those who support Youth Program Leaders. This support could be for specialist activities, management, or involved in specialist support teams. Many of these Leaders lead other adults.

At the Local (Scout Group) level

Group Leader

A Leader appointed to be the local manager of a Scout Group. Their role is to support the Section Leaders and manage the Group's affairs

Section Leader

Uniformed Leaders who support young people in the delivery of the Program of a particular youth section.

Adult Helper

A Member appointed to assist in the delivery of the Youth Program on a regular basis within a Group or other Team.

Youth Helper

Youth Members who have additional leadership roles in Scouting that include assisting with the delivery of the Youth Program.

Group Support

These Members assist with the running of a Scout Group by taking on such roles like Treasurer and Quartermaster.

Outside the Scout Group

Group management to the 110+ Scouts Groups in WA starts with Group Leaders and is supported by the Commissioners (managers) in the 4 Regions and their teams of District and Specialist Commissioners.

District and Regional Commissioners

Uniformed Leaders appointed to manage and support Scout Groups and the Members within, in a District or Regional level.

Branch Commissioners, Advisers and Leaders

Uniformed Leaders and Managers appointed to oversee specific portfolios designed to support the organisation at a State level.

Team Members

These members provide assistance to specialist Teams who deliver things such as training, adventurous activities, welfare or environmental activities

Other Supports

These non-Leader members provide support, assistance, knowledge resources and to the Assocation in varying specialist ways.

Fellowship Membersrs

Members of the association who are willing to assist in non-uniformed support areas. This could be helping to fundraise, or assisting at events.

Life Members

Members who are long serving adults who have been recognised with permanent membership. Many are still active and continue to support the delivery of the Program in other roles as well.

Staff

Paid employees of the association who work in Scout's Head Office, Recycling Centres, or Adventure Centres to professionally support the work the association does in the community.

Volunteer Training Supporting the Youth Program

One Program, One Journey, One Curriculum

Training for all Adult Leaders, and many Rover Scouts in Western Australia comprises of five proficiency-based components which relate to the functions of their role. Our curriculum provides the skills and knowledge required to support Scouts on their journey through the Youth Program.

Scouts Australia's Wood Badge Training Program follows the requirements of the World Organisation of the Scout Movement (WOSM).

More than 90% of Scouting's volunteers say that this has helped them develop personal and practical skills. Feedback and evidence from employers reinforce this success, with organisations reporting that staff who have been involved in scouting being above average employees.

Scouting Preliminary

Introduces new Leaders to the elements which form the foundation of Scouting and gives them an understanding of how they can be involved in supporting the program.

Scouting Essentials

Provides all Adult Leaders the essential skills and knowledge of our program, as well as an understanding of how the program contributes to the personal progression of our youth members. Leaders learn about the tools and methods used through a youth-led program and patrol system, which empowers youth members to achieve their full potential.

Our Recycling Centres and Growth

Scouts WA Recycling

The Scouts WA partnership with Containers for Change has seen Scouts WA successfully prevent over 64 million containers being sent to landfill in Western Australia since October 2020.

Last financial year, Scouts WA Recycling returned over \$96,000 earned through Containers for Change to Scouting. Funds have been used to improve resources for Scouting members throughout the state as we work towards helping even more young people to seek new skills, adventures and challenges through Scouting this year.

General Manager, Jack Seward, confirms the success of Scouts WA Recycling is multi-faceted. The teams focus on making the returns process convenient, fast, and simple with excellent customer service to reflect the Scouts purpose and principles.

In addition to the positive environmental impact, Scouts WA has used the opportunity to embrace our core commitment to providing positive social impact.

In partnership with At Work Australia and other employment providers, Scouts WA Recycling has created 40 new roles providing meaningful employment, training and a sustainable income to young people, people living with disabilities, the long term unemployed and Indigenous Australians.

Recycle

Four depots with over-the-counter refund points are conveniently located in Wangara, Kenwick, Cockburn Central and Malaga.

Customers drive into their nearest Scouts WA Recycling centre with eligible containers where our staff quickly sort and count them at one of our under-cover Refund Points. Within minutes, customers receive confirmation of their refund amount, and they are paid immediately via cash or directly into their bank accounts.

Customers can also choose to donate part or all of their refund to Scouts WA or their individual Scout Group.

We founded the Scouts WA Adventure Centres (SWAAC) in 2021. We are proud to confirm profits generated from our Adventure Centres last year contributed to funding WA Scouts activities and resources for members. Our SWAAC portfolio and activities also supported the Fundamentals of Scouting in several ways.

Primarily, SWAAC is invested in providing adventures and activities that align to promote Scout youth members' exploration of, and progression through, key outdoor pursuits. At the same time, SWAAC introduces Scouting to a wider range of WA youth and adults.

Currently consisting of five centres across the Southwest of WA, management of all sites in SWAAC is now based at our Manjedal offices with a small team headed up by General Manager and Queen Scout, Jon Sayer.

Centralising our WA Scout sites into one location has further promoted the development of our sites and facilities, activities, and offerings in line with the Outdoor Adventure Skills framework.

This framework has nine broad activity streams including nine developmental stages within each stream. Activities range from Bushcraft and Camping, through to more specialised activities such as Cycling, Vertical and Aquatic.

SWAAC assists our youth member's pathway to learning the Outdoor Adventure Skills in two important ways:

Providing access to safe, quality spaces for the adventures, activities and skills that Scouting is well

known for and creating a consistent revenue stream for Scouting WA that will benefit all our Scout WA members.

Our Vision for 2023

Our vision for SWAACs, using the Scouting Method, is to be the leading providers of outdoor education (camping skills) and adventurous activities in Western Australia. We will be working to increase our reputation with Scouts, Schools, and Community Groups, as an exciting location for camping and a provider of comprehensive camping skills programs.

This year, we are committed to working collaboratively with more WA Scout Groups. SWAAC is focused on providing specific guidance to WA Scouts that will help them link the Outdoor Adventure Skills framework to specific SWAAC sites and activities. This information is being designed so Groups will be able to individualise and tailor the programs to suit their participants.

We particularly love it when our Scout Groups bring their young people to a SWAAC as part of their section program. Apart from the opportunity to meet and work with our Scouts, this simple support helps to ensure cash flows directly back into our resources for continuous maintenance and improvements for everyone involved with Scouts WA.





Scouts Fundraising, Events & Community Engagement

Given its potential to improve children's short and long-term outcomes, building resilience in our youth provides a foundation for developing coping skills and healthy thinking habits that are important for their mental health, ongoing.

Scouts recognises that youth, adolescents, and young adults with greater levels of resilience are better able to manage stress, acknowledged as a risk factor for mental health conditions in youth.

As part of our core commitment, purpose and principles, the Scout Program empowers young people to make decisions, take the lead and learn by doing. We provide safe spaces to work with others to plan and embark on their own adventures, indoors and out.

This builds the resilience in young people that inspires learning, the confidence to make mistakes and the understanding that success sometimes means things don't always work out the first time you try them.

The Scout program is not possible without your support, the generosity of our sponsors and grants supporting our vision, projects and people.

Our volunteer members and Grants and Projects Officer, Cesare Papa, worked collaboratively to plan, prepare and secure grants, funding and sponsorship this year. The additional fundraising was applied to programs, materials and supports essential for a successful, balanced Scouting program to run and develop continuously.

Grants for new buildings and equipment will help to invite more people to Scouting and to be able to participate in this nurturing youth program.

Main grants/project highlights include:

Lotterywest Block Grant - \$143,408

For 19 Scout Groups and 3 Adventure Centre campsites from Lotterywest to fund a range of equipment including tents, camping equipment, sporting equipment.

Highlights

Bassendean Scout Group | \$14,242

Funds received to start a brand-new Scout Group including camping equipment, computer & trailers

Manjedal Campsite | \$11,519

Setup of honey collection facility – fitting out a sea container with internal kitchen furnishings, etc

Vasse Campsite | \$12,612

Respite facility fit out – funds received to repair, furnish, and fit out a lodge for DCP respite accommodation for at-risk youth

Pelican Point Sea Scouts Group | \$36,525

Funds received for a brand-new safety boat which will be available to 120 youth members. Core group operation to train members to sail, row, swim, paddle, navigate and respond to emergencies. The boat can be used on open waters, made available to complete prerequisite training to attain a Recreational Skipper's Ticket – this service will be provided free of charge to all members of Scouts WA. Youth members regularly assist stranded boats by retrieving, towing, ferrying, and repairing as the situation requires.

Election Commitment Grants

Multiple Scout Groups received funding directly through the state government honouring election promises made in 2020/21.

Highlights

Carramar Scout Group | \$3,000,000

To build a brand-new Scout Hall in Tapping, for the Carramar Scout Group (100+ members). The project has progressed, and the design has achieved Planning Approval with the City of Wanneroo. The Ground Lease has been voted in favour at Ordinary Council. Scouts WA will be proceeding to procurement and finding a builder in September 2022.

Carey Park Scout Group | \$210,000

To refurbish and expand the Carey Park Scout Group Hall. The Group has already found a builder, and the works have commenced.

Volunteer Grants 2021 | \$62,366

Funds secured for 16 Scout Groups receiving local government grants, administered through the Department of Social Services (DSS). Used to improve, upgrade and provide equipment.

STEM Engagement Grant | \$19,190

Federal government funding to run travelling regional STEM workshop events for regional events in Kununurra, Esperance, Albany and Geraldton – including activities such as electrical circuits, making catapults, chemical rockets, Lego robots and more. Delivered to youth ages 5 to 15.

Positive Outcomes for Resilient Scouts

From being able to find ways to solve a problem to being more likely to forgive themselves if they make a mistake, the Resilience Survey (compiled by Resilient Youth Australia in 2020) found Scouts demonstrate a far wider range of resilient behaviours than their peers.

Scouts also demonstrated higher levels of resilience when compared to their non-Scouting peers, and this result was consistent across a number of elements of resilience, including Positive Relationships, Social Skills, Understanding Self, Safe, Healthy Mind and Body, Positive Learners, Positive Identity, Positive Values and Positive Contribution.

And that's not all – the Resilience Survey also revealed that Scouts report to have an overall better life satisfaction than their peers, and that the longer they stay in Scouts the more resilient they are likely to be.

Events and Training

Scouting delivers opportunities to participate in programs, events, activities, and projects. These experiences contribute to the growth of young people, guided by adult volunteers.

Over the course of the program, we provide increasing opportunities for our members to take the initiative with 'youth leading, adult supporting' as one of our fundamental goals.

We provide an experience that is all about connecting with the outdoors; building new and existing friendships; learning new skills; and helping create a better world.

Scouts WA delivered over 156 events covering a wide range of topics and experiences last year. From planning to participating, Scouts are involved and invited to participate in every aspect of their development.



Scouts WA 2021-2022 Financials

The financial results for Scouts WA FY22 are reflective of our expansion into two business ventures that are still in the development stages, the ongoing effects of Redress Payments, and COVID cancellations at Scouts WA Adventure Centres (SWAAC).

The State operations continue to be financially supported by positive contributions from SWAAC of \$234,895 and Scouts WA investments of \$469,298.

The Container Deposit Scheme (CDS) in its start-up phase, had increases in various costs. The leasing and equipment purchased also had a substantial effect on depreciation costs. However, payoff of these expenditures has continued with the business experiencing rapid growth in the past year.

The CDS is already cashflow positive. In FY22, the contribution was \$95,660. This is expected to be much higher next year and is projected to exceed \$500,000.

The Containers for Change and SWAAC are both already reporting improved revenue up from last year, despite the SWAAC continuing to be affected by continuing COVID-19 cancellations.

These funds will be reinvested to move to improve and expand the Member experience, including a focus on improving branch processes and systems to deliver better member services and enable members to spend less time on "paperwork" and more time on activities.


Although the financial year results show a net loss of \$670,1863, this includes costs of Redress Payments for \$102,385 and depreciation of assets within the organisation totalling \$596,664.

Redress Payments will continue to be a cost for some time to come as noted last year and reserves will be set aside in anticipation of this. Staff changes have also added to higher operation costs in FY22.


Looking forward for 2023, Scouts WA is focused on the growth of the organisation's income capability. Scouts WA also has a renewed focus on philanthropy and donations.

Thanks to our diligent, professional, and capable staff, executive team and board of directors, we are once again well positioned to grow and take advantage of further opportunities in the coming years.


Current Ratio 2.49 Times Assets to Liabilities




Assets, Liabilities and Equity
